

FERRARI MAKES A BREAK FROM THE BORDER

FERRARI HUNTER Tom Shaughnessy chased this 250 GTE Series II for eight years, finally finding it in a barn close to the Mexican border. He discovered it at the Otay Mesa border car lot, California, which was bursting with 50,000 cars donated to charitable causes – not the place you'd exsect to find an old Ferrari.

It was stuffed in a corner, under a sheet, surrounded by damaged cars. The interior is partially disassembled, but looks reasonably complete. The data plate is missing, but the engine and chassis numbers match: both serial number 3921.

The GTE's new owner John Carlson was

with Shaughnessy when they took the cover off: "It was clear that someone had tried to restore it at one point and whoever that was didn't know much about Ferraris." The find included a rusty old oriefcase full of receipts and details of a decade's-worth of restoration attempts.

The car steered and stopped, so we figured we had at least something to work with. I still had not heard the car run, but Tom said he'd heard it a few months ago and there were no audible death ratiles.

Carison's 250 GTE is one of 356 Series IIs built, powered by a 240bhp three-litre V12. It could be worth £40,000 when it's restored.
